

Security Corner: Scammers Using USPS to Nab Victims

So you or a family member received a letter via the US Postal Service saying you can collect \$11.6 million because it's been unclaimed and you can pass for a distant relative of the deceased. The letter comes on official-looking stationary with a logo from Standard Chartered Bank. Perhaps you know that Standard Chartered is an actual bank and that their logo looks like this:



But you're pretty savvy. You also know that inheritance schemes circulate wildly through the Internet, but scammers don't use the US Postal Service to look for victims, right? That would be mail fraud, which is a felony carrying a sentence of up to five years in prison and fines of up to \$250,000 for individuals. And the penalties can quadruple if a financial institution is involved! No one would take those kinds of risks, right? Wrong.

People are taking those risks because they're paying off. Here's a copy of an actual letter that was sent to someone in September 2019. However, the fact that they are delivered to us via the old-fashioned mail service might make them more believable.

Hello, this letter may come to you as a surprise as we have not met before or handled any business deal in the past. Nevertheless, I have contacted you with genuine intentions and I hope I can trust you with this Inheritance opportunity which I explain below.

My name is Mr. Peter Pfizer, an account manager with Standard Chartered Bank, London United Kingdom. I retrieved your contact address in my search for the next of kin to a deceased customer of our bank MR. Safety Corner: Lay It on Me! Dress in Layers When Spending Time Outdoors in Cold Weather

BRRRING DOWN THE RISKS OF FROSTBITE AND HYPOTHERMIA IN THE COLD

- Keep moving
- Take extra care if it's wet or windy outdoors
- Wear warm, loose, layered clothing
- Cover your feet, hands, face, and head
- Get to a warm area and into warm, dry clothes or blankets if you're:
 - Having frostbite or hypothermia symptoms;
 - Wet; or
 - Uncomfortably cold or numb.

FROSTBITE = FROZEN TISSUES

Symptoms:

- Feel extremely cold, numb, and possibly tingly or aching
- White or grayish yellow glossy skin, sometimes followed by blisters



"Okay, okay, we'll turn up the thermostat."

TREATMENT:

- Warm frozen part with blankets or warm (not hot)
- Don't rub the body part, drink caffeine, or break blisters.
- Don't warm with a hot stove, heat lamp, or hot water bottle.
- Exercise warmed body part (but stay off frostbitten feet).
- Get medical attention.

HYPOTHERMIA = DANGEROUSLY LOW BODY TEMPERATURE

Symptoms:

- Chills, shivering, and numbness
- Slurred speech, poor coordination, confusion, drowsiness

TREATMENT:

- Cover with blankets and/or provide body heat.
- Don't give hot baths, or use electric blankets, or use hot water bottles.
- Keep the person awake.
- Get medical attention.


